Letter from our Curate, Rev. Heather McCulloch

Sort your Life Out!

It's the season when some of us think of clearing out our cupboards and sheds and doing a bit of a 'spring clean' as the sunshine shows up the dirt on the windows. I wonder if you have been as captivated as I have by Stacey Solomon and her team, as they promise to 'Sort your life out in 7 days' on BBC I. They help people to empty their homes into a warehouse and let go of around half of all they possess. It is inspiring – who wouldn't want their lives sorted out that quickly? And they appear to do an incredible job of real transformation. There is no doubt that the spaces we inhabit, have a significant impact on how we feel. And we seem to agree, according to Checkatrade's Home Pride Index, in 2022 British households collectively spent over £50bn on home improvements.

The problem is, we can live in beautiful, uncluttered surroundings, and feel good about ourselves, but improving our home doesn't really improve our heart. The real trouble starts inside us, where we hide the feelings we can't explain or excuse. I wonder if our real malaise is more to do with the pace of life and the lack of space for reflection, perhaps even prayer. Have you ever taken the time to sit in a beautiful historic building, and just listen? Once your heart slows down and the silence settles, you can give your mind the space to catch up with your body and reveal itself. As a Christian I believe this is where we meet with God himself and hear His perspective on our inner turmoil. In our villages we have two stunning historic churches; St Mary's Freeland, a remarkable example of Victorian gothic revival, and St Peter and St Paul an ancient church dating back to at least 1130 A.D. This beautiful building with its huge spire and ancient gracious profile, has served as a visual symbol for the Christian faith and life of the community for centuries.

Literally thousands of people have encountered Jesus in prayer and worship right here in these churches. Some people even speak of 'thin places' where the presence of God seems more easily accessible, certainly there is something about the quiet stillness that is deeply peaceful. If you ever feel the need to reflect or decompress, you are always welcome to come in and experience the 'thinness' for yourself – both these churches are unlocked during the day and have morning worship at 10am on Sundays.



As it turns out we are having to do some 'improvements' of our own involving serious maintenance on St Peter and St Paul Church. Some 150 years ago, the Victorians rebuilt and reinforced the 15th Century spire, but the lifetime on that rebuild was... 150 years! Following in-depth structural analysis, our architect has told us that unless this spire receives at least £350,000 of work, it will eventually become unsafe, collapse, and could damage the whole building!

Green tip

When talking about the climate crisis it is becoming more important than ever to address the contribution transport makes to the release of polluting greenhouse gasses. Whilst there has been great progress in reducing emissions from the electrical grid by installing wind and solar energy, the picture on transport is not so rosy. Currently, the transport sector contributes about a 1/3 to our overall emissions. This number remains obstinately high as some people adopt bigger and more polluting SUVs.

Whilst the greenest way of getting from A to B is to walk, cycle or take public transport, these options are not always available, and we are forced back into our private cars. There has been a lot of coverage in certain areas of the press regarding the suitability of electric cars, mainly around cost and charger availability. Certainly, prices are coming down all the time as the market becomes more competitive. Additionally, there is now a thriving market in second hand electric cars, making them even more affordable.

There are also some great salary sacrifice schemes to ease the cost of purchase through work. Running costs have always been very attractive, and as polluting fossil fuel prices increase electric cars make better financial sense.

So far, this year has been a bumper year for charger installations, and current figures put the number of publicly available chargers at over 60,000. It should also be remembered that most charging is performed at home. Currently, electric cars account for about 17% of the UK new car market, and there are plenty of owners in the village.

If you are interested in an electric car then perhaps use the contact details provided by the Freeland Energy Group (see **page 37**) to contact an existing local owner, and see what owners really think about their electric cars.



OXFORD BUS AND MORRIS MOTORS MUSEUMS

Father's Day is on **Sunday 16th June.** Dads bringing their child under 16 years old will be given **free entry** to the museums and a slice of chocolate cake! There will be free historic bus rides at **12.15 and 2.15pm.**

The previous **Sunday, the 9th June,** is our Historic Cycle Day. There will be displays by members of the Veteran-Cycle Club, who will bring bikes, lamps and other accessories from their private collections, talks by our volunteers about the museum's bikes and their development during the nineteenth century. Previous Historic Cycle Days have proved extremely popular, and visitors have lots of fun on the novelty bikes.

The photograph is of an 1879 Haynes & Jefferies Ariel lever tension wheel ordinary bike, the first British all metal bicycle to be made in any quantity. It was patented by James Starley in August 1870. Earlier bicycles had been made of wood with wooden spokes and a metal rim to hold the wooden tyre in place.

In place of the wooden spokes this bicycle had a single wire, similar to today's piano string, threaded between the central hub and the rim. The levers connecting the hub to the rim tensioned all the spokes at the



same time. By using enough spokes capable of resisting tension, the load applied at the centre of the wheel was transmitted to the ground without appreciable distortion of the rim. The wheel will fail immediately without sufficient tension.

The Ariel's wheel had two serious faults. First the spokes could not be tensioned individually, so a wheel could not be trued. Secondly, although the spokes worked well as the rider pedalled forward, when pedalling backwards on a downhill stretch, the spokes came under compression, so the wheel became slack with unnerving consequences.

Tension spokes were quickly replaced with the development of separate metal spokes which could be tensioned individually and the invention of the pneumatic tyre by JB Dunlop in 1888. www.oxfordbusmuseum.org

FREELAND ORCHESTRA 11th MAY CONCERT REVIEW

What a wonderful afternoon we had on the 11th May listening to the Freeland Orchestra in Eynsham's St Leonard's church. This 30-strong group, made up of local amateur musicians, gave a very accomplished performance under the baton of local music teacher and oboist, Wendy Marks.

The concert started with the Overture to The Merry Wives of Windsor by the relatively unknown composer Otto Nicolai. This was an exciting piece with the different characters of Falstaff and his wives coming across clearly. First the heavy, almost plodding nature of Falstaff himself, followed by lighter, more dance-like sections representing his wives.

Then we were treated to Rimsky-Korsakov's "The Tsar's Bride", which was in quite a different musical style being very Russian in sound, as opposed to the romantic nature of the Overture. The brass section shone here in their fanfare sections, and there was some very assured playing from the violins in some high soaring melodies. The strong bass line of cellos and bassoons was intrinsic to this whole piece.

The main work of this concert was Mendelssohn's Italian Symphony and straight away it was clear that this had been well-rehearsed. The wind players all had a chance to shine, particularly the clarinets which Mendelssohn seemed to favour. The slow movement theme was played by the oboe, bassoon and viola, combining to make one homogeneous sound, with some very skilful flute playing weaving around the melody. The third movement Minuet flowed along smoothly whilst the "Trio" was reminiscent of the Nocturne from Mendelssohn's Midsummer Night's Dream music, with its French horn/ bassoon writing.

The finale was a Salterello, a dance which includes jumping, and this came out in the lively playing of the musicians. There was real excitement in this movement and the concentration on the part of the players was evident.

The audience were very appreciative of the performance today and of all the hard work that the players had obviously put in to achieve this standard. Though the real credit must surely go to the conductor, Wendy Marks, who started the group 17 years ago, rehearsing in Freeland Methodist Church.

donations that we have to either recycle (due to being too old or too damaged) or take to charity shops (due to their lack of general appeal).


We don't mean to sound ungrateful: most of the books that get donated are fantastic, and soon get snapped up from the shelves, but there are some books that really are better off being recycled.

Review of Wind Concert on Saturday 11th May at St Leonard's Church, Eynsham

You can't beat live music! On Saturday evening it was a choice between the Eurovision Song Contest live-streamed or a feast of musical styles played 'live' by West Oxfordshire's wind ensembles, WOC, WOL WOCI and WOW.

What a great opener – Humperdinck's Overture to Hansel and Gretel. **WOC** (fifteen clarinets, including alto, bass and high Eb) really evoked that prayerful feeling and the dynamics were stunning, with middle parts particularly expressive. First clarinets gave us great articulation and shrill trills, in keeping with the drama of the piece and its magical sense of foreboding. Then on to Kurt Weill, with excellent dotted rhythms. But the next piece 'Jubilation' made all sit up and lean in through its rhythmic complexity, handled really well. The section finished with Dodge City where you could sense wagons rolling through town, while the percussion section denoted well those trotting horses.

West Oxfordshire Learners (**WOL**) now take the stage. Conductor Wendy Marks has a reassuring careful attention to tuning and preparation – she has taught many here and inspires the players in developing a sense of musical autonomy – you can do it ('1'll create a part for you! I'll rearrange the part so you can play'!) Lovely variety of musical styles now, including ET (good dynamics here, and players passing the tune back and forth between them). Then to Jeeves and Wooster, followed by New York, New York, where the saxes really shone.

The second half of the concert brought us West Oxfordshire Clarinets Intermediate (**WOCI**), followed by West Oxfordshire Winds (**WOW**), who produce a broad palette of sonorous colour through the additional bank of flutes, cornets, oboes, saxophones, French horn and trombone.

WOCI gave us some fine playing especially in the traditional tune, the Irish Washerwoman, with particularly well-articulated staccato passages. Great energy here. There was a lovely bass clarinet sonority played sensitively in the traditional Norwegian tune and with good attack in Grand Day Out.

On to **WOW**, much bigger forces to coordinate and arrange. There's palpable enthusiasm here and musical friendships. Everyone depends on each other, while carrying individual responsibility for being at the right place in the right time. It was refreshing to hear longer works – especially the Planets, the Glen Miller medley and Les Miserables. There was a good deal of characterful playing in the Glen Miller - trombone glissandi, and middle register instruments in Little Brown Jug doing a great job on the off beats to keep the momentum clearly driving forward. In Les Mis there was beautiful sustained playing from flutes and oboes, especially in 'I Dreamed a Dream', supported by lots of colour in the middle parts. 'Do you hear the people sing' always brings a tear to the eye, and this evening Wendy kept those dynamics really effective, with all eyes on her sound-guiding gestures. And finally all four groups joined together to play Pamela March. Reeds, mouthpieces, stands, sheet music, chairs, shining instruments all glittering and moving into position under the lights of St Leonard's Church. The stage management works smoothly and the church bursts into the rhythms of a marching band. And so with a spring in our steps we leave the concert. We sense Wendy's boundless energy and enthusiasm and above all, the recognition of everyone present having fun through live music-making. Oh, and we get home in time to see the winning song of Eurovision 2024. But that's another story...


